

MESSAGE from the Board of Directors



Inhale / Exhale

In this changing season, as with every fall, we reflect on where we have been over the past year, and all that we have seen. All that has changed us.

We are lucky to be grounded in a sense of place. Nature surrounds, teaches, inspires and has supported life for a long time. The Sinixt, Sylix, Ktuxana, and Yaqan Nukij Lower Kootenay Band are each present, as are the Métis and many diverse Indigenous persons. We strive towards greater connection with the traditional lands and people. This endeavour, though specific, also extends further.

Oxygen looks to achieve experimental, accessible and inclusive programming. As a Board, our role is to understand and ensure this mission in all decisions. We meet monthly to align this mandate with the operations, programming, and outlook of the organisation. We are a sounding board for the Executive Director, Julia Prudhomme, providing support for her, facilitating links to the community where needed, and guiding the growth of this centre.

Artist-Run.

There is a harmony of voices that create a sense of place here. Oxygen has long been an artistic catalyst for the community, inviting and fostering creative expression. The mentors, teachers, advisors... volunteers, students, supporters... members, donors, and of course the artists.... all contribute their own piece and presence to sustaining this collective practice. This makes up the breath moving through the body.

The board is part of this process - the backbone which is straightening to keep flow smooth. We have seen over the past year some significant changes to the structure of OAC. These will take some time to ripple through to reflect in our offerings. We work internally to create shifts that will allow us to flourish as a transformed entity.

Namely, this October saw Natasha depart from her role as the Education Coordinator. As one of the founding members of the Oxygen Art Centre (Nelson Fine Arts Society), her manner of filling the role was deft, capably coordinating a bounty of offerings that ranged from technical to playful, collaborative to hyper-focused, and covering a sliding scale of reciprocity too. We honour her efforts, and were incredibly happy to celebrate at the Education Open House. The thoughtful, expansive exhibit and warm attendance is a spark which points to all that Natasha brought to Oxygen. We wish her the best.

We are establishing baseline roles which define contributions. In all this, we maintain flexibility and support. We aim to arrive at aligned decisions, moving at the speed of trust. We are steered willingly by Julia who always amazes; she is behind much of the wonder here. Physical space is one aspect. Events and art draw people in. Oxygen is a breathing, living rhizome - as a draft manifesto by a past board states.

Over the past year, we have devoted time to the following activities:

With Julia's help, we explored the meaning and extents of 'facility'. There are some basic necessities involved in an artist-run operation which hosts residencies and exhibitions, art classes and roving events. These are fulfilled by our current space along the alleyway, an industrial space which is made our own with the help of all those artistically and functionally involved.

Board Member Christine Wallace led us through some immense change in governance. With the guidance of the Columbia Basin Trust's Nonprofit Advisors Program, and much research besides, we workshopped to arrive at a place of greater clarity - yet we maintain breathing room. As we deepen our work together, become stable in our decisions and move forward with a fresh renewal, we identify our scopes, and also where some help is needed.

Alongside this, members of the board took the time to review exhibition proposals, maintain accounting, and engage membership. Thank you Carol Wallace for your unwavering involvement. We are lucky to hold your time and attention for another year. Thank you Allison Talbot-Kelley for your imagination and voice which cuts to the centre of discussion. Thank you Laurel Terlesky for bringing your experience and dedication to the arts. Thank you Gabby Asbell for your involvement and enthusiasm. I am so excited for us all to prosper together in the coming year.

Thank you Marilyn Lee for your time and insight. This brought us greater clarity of the options available to us. Thank you to Vincent Karcher for sharing your perspectives as a rural artist. Though they have stepped back from board involvement, we are grateful for the contributions of both individuals and seek to connect along future paths.

A large thanks to Julia for your effort and excellence. Your commitment allows us to stay calm, and your effort is not taken for granted. The things that you manage to do are complex and paramount. We believe in you, appreciate you, and trust your choices. We are with you, and keen to share greater responsibilities so that you may work in a way that lands between effort and ease.

Oxygen is a process. It does not necessarily grow, it simply is. It flows, in and out, through and within. It relates to the environment, it is solitary while engaging, grounding and lifting. Oxygen is oneness.

Oxygen is a place for community. It is a means to explore and understand the past and present, imagine in the way that art allows, and meet through mediums and material. It is a curiosity, open to interpretation.

With gratitude for all that is, We look forward to what's to come



MESSAGE from the Executive Director: Julia Prudhomme

The 2023-2024 year at Oxygen Art Centre is cause for celebration! Across the Exhibition & Residency and Education programs, we expanded our offerings through additions like the O2 window exhibition space and bathroom installation space, increased community-focused events and classes, secured multi-year funding, and implemented essential policies and training opportunities for staff and board.

A few highlights include the international residency and exhibition, *The Hungry Mist,* featuring artists **Bento Leite** (Brazil), **Dyó Potyguara** (Brazil), **Simon(e)** Jakiriuma Paetau (Germany/ Colombia) with guest artist Cecilia Vilca (Peru). The culmination of a years-long curatorial research project by **Rodrigo d'Alcantara** (Brazil/Canada), *The Hungry Mist* brought together trans and queer Latin American artists whose work explores environmental, neocolonial futurities through video, performance, and painting.

In our new O2 window exhibition space, we presented new works by regionally based artists, including **Ink and Moon Collective, Marcus Dénommé, Tracy Fillion, and Hannah DeBoer-Smith.** Traversing urgencies related to the Palestinian genocide to contemporary textile art practices, O2 provided public space to share these works with passersby in downtown Nelson. Developing innovative ways to support and share contemporary art with our community comes in all sizes—from gallery to window to bathroom and everywhere in between.

With the support of project funding, we were able to offer more free or sliding scale programming, including *Lost Cat!*, the **Author Reading Series**, figure and nature still life drawing classes, and the four-day studio workshop series, *Between Futurity and Futility* facilitated by **Chris Dufour and Alexis Hogan**. These programs received an overwhelmingly positive response from attendees, with special note to Dufour and Hogan's four-day workshop, which entangled ecologically centred practices of ink making, dyeing, and plant-based film development alongside the use of the body. Planting the literal and proverbial seed for Dufour's summer residency, the workshop care-fully explored ecological grief in all its complexities.

Alongside these triumphs, post-pandemic programming and funding shifts also signalled a need for review and planning towards strategic change at the artist-run centre. A downturn in regular art class registrations and warnings of economic austerity and post-pandemic funding cuts began infiltrating discussions within the sector at provincial and local levels. The economic stimulation that non-profit arts organizations had accessed during the pandemic—Oxygen included—had reached a startling conclusion concurrently with regional economic realities becoming more austere. In response to these changes, Oxygen's team undertook a full financial and statistical review to identify trends from 2018 to the present, with an eye to the future. These findings will inform Oxygen's forthcoming strategic planning initiatives into the new year.

This ongoing background labour is buoyed by Oxygen's staff, board, and contributors, including our incredible faculty, artists, and collaborating organizations. An extra special thank you to outgoing Education Coordinator **Natasha Smith**, whose over ten years in the role brought expertise and generosity to the artist-run centre that will be greatly missed. Thank you to our summer students, **Daniel Reilly and Gabby Asbell**, who infused creativity in their independent research projects and administrative roles. I am also indebted to the brilliant board of directors, who have been a great source of support, dialogue, and guidance throughout this year—your fierce commitment to the artist-run centre is everything.

I look back on this year humbled by everyone who has contributed to Oxygen Art Centre. Together, we are a beautiful, shimmering, interconnected spider's web that revolves around contemporary art. I look ahead with great excitement as we reflect, research, and plan for Oxygen's many futures. *Thank you.*






The 2023/24 fiscal year for OAC's Education Programming (Adult & Youth) comprised of three semesters:

Fall Semester: Sept. 18 - Nov 10 2023 Spring Semester: Feb. 8 - Mar. 15 2024

Spring/Summer Semester: May 20 - June 24 2024

We are welcomed three new instructors to teach at Oxygen this fiscal year:

Summary

Fall Semester: Sept. 18 - Nov 10 2023

Registration for the Fall 2023 regular education programming was lower than the Fall of 2022, which we expected due to the increased cost of living impacting how people spent their money. The affordable community programming was very popular with all 7 courses running (including 2 courses facilitated by The Polka Dot Dragon Arts Society (PDDAS)). We were able to run 8 out of the 13 regular adult education courses offered. This resulted in a decrease in education revenue, but engagement overall was strong with 97 people participating in programming. It seemed timely to be offering more affordable community programming to support our community through these difficult financial times.

Spring Semester: Feb. 8 - Mar. 15 2024 & Spring/Summer Semester: May 20 - June 24 2024

Due to a reduction in funding (post-COVID), it was identified that the Education Program needed to contribute more to support the costs of the Centre's overhead and education administration, so course costs for 2024 courses were increased and day-time programming was introduced including Creative Time for New Parents, ARTful Fridays and Pop-Up PD Day. The resulting combined revenues for these two semesters were an improvement on last year at this time, due to running two semesters instead of one, along with inclusion of this additional daytime programming. The highlighted courses below indicate courses where I taught and did not receive an instructor wage (it was part of my coordinator hours/wage). I volunteered to do this to support this new daytime pilot programming. A number of courses in Spring 2024 needed extra promotion and work to get them to run and registration deadlines were extended. It is important to acknowledge Executive Director Julia Prudhomme's ongoing time investment and support of the Education Programming, including graphic design work, promotion, instructor payments and consultation, this support is essential to the success and feasibility of running this programming.

Youth Programming

In the Fall of 2023 both youth programs: Rock/Paper/Scissors (11-14yrs) and Worm/ Hole (15-18yrs) ran successfully and further youth programming was scheduled for 2024. Unfortunately there was very low engagement for youth programming for the first two semesters of 2024 which resulted in all four courses being canceled. We did inquire with past students as to why they were not enrolling this time round, and the main reason was time conflicts with other after school programming. We introduced two more day-time youth education classes, one that was targeted to Homeschool and Wildflower for students who do not attend school on Fridays. This unfortunately did not run, but with further outreach to the Homeschool and Wildflower communities this may be programming that can be pursued in the future. The introduction of a Pop-Up PD Day course was successful (stats included above)

NDCU Funding for Youth Programming NDCU continued their support of OAC's youth programming with a community grant of \$1,500. This funding has been used to subsidize youth course costs to assure affordability and accessibility to this programming, including a full student scholarship to Rock/Paper/Scissors in the Fall of 2024.

Youth Art Retreat

The Youth Art Retreat (CKCA funded project) was canceled due to low registration. We investigated pivoting to offer the same programming (with the same artists) as a day camp at Kokanee Creek Provincial Park on August 20, 21 & 22 but due to a number of delays and complications the short timeline was not feasible to be able to successfully plan and run the camp. We are currently looking at a fall 2024 iteration of the project.

Lost Cat!

Oxygen Art Centre presented a series of community art events entitled Lost Cat! Taking place during the Fall 2023 and Spring 2024 semesters, the series offered free art-making sessions with regional artists on a range of artistic mediums. This project was generously funded by CKCA.

The title, Lost Cat, translates a playful sense of collective curiosity for the arts that is at the heart of the concept and practice of Oxygen's community-based arts programming.

There were 5 events in total. This free to attend series of community art-making events were enthusiastically attended with great feedback from participants.

This will be my last AGM report as I will be stepping down from my position as the OAC Education Coordinator as of October 3, 2024. I would like to acknowledge the amazing support and work of Executive Director Julia Prudhomme. It has been a privilege to work and learn from her. Through shared dedication we have worked to actively support our faculty and student base this fiscal year and have facilitated the creation of rich and innovative educational programming, providing opportunities for our community to engage in contemporary creative practice.

Notes on the 2023-2024 Financial Report

In review of the financial details from the last year, the board is reminded of the rallying attempts of federal and provincial funders to address the difficulties faced by arts organizations since the pandemic. One of our resident artists this past year spoke of the "mad money" that arose from this time where resources seemed abundant and allowed for experimentation with arts engagement.

For revenues of grant funds, the report reflects a small increase due to a large amount from Canada Council, but overall a decrease in funding sources is seen. The grants aimed at resilience are now at their end, including the BCAC Resilience program that was a significant portion of funds till this year. Additionally, there was a noticeable decline in revenue from the educational side of Oxygen's operating mandate. This is likely due to increased competition in the nearby community of similar arts programming, where the relatively higher cost of Oxygen's classes reflect the commitment to higher wages for its instructors. Combined with higher overhead costs, this is an area that will need to be revisioned, to leverage the more successful avenues of exhibitions, residencies, and youth arts education.

Despite the apparent decline reflected in unrealized funding, the reality is that a comparison to pre-pandemic levels demonstrates that Oxygen has been successful before at meeting its mission—and is well-positioned to do so again. This will entail a pivotal approach to its operations, particularly for the balance of exhibitions and residencies and of the educational program. Shifting community needs are being examined to determine how best to leverage Oxygen's position in providing relevant programming, to support arts practice in youth to emerging and established practicing artists of all mediums.

1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Capital Assets

Capital assets are recorded at cost. Amortization is calculated on the declining balance basis at the following annual rates:

Library	20%
Office furniture & equipment	20%
Program equipment	20%
Signs	20%
Computers	55%
Leasehold Improvements	10%

The provision for amortization is reduced by one-half in the year of acquisition and no amortization is recorded in the year of disposition.

Goods and Services Tax

Goods and services tax is recoverable at a 50% as a rebate. The unrecoverable portion is recorded as an expense.

2. Restricted Cash

A portion of the Society's cash is externally restricted by the respective funding agencies. Any funds, which are not expended in accordance with the provisions of the funding agreements, must be returned to the respective funding agencies. The Society records these funds as restricted cash and a corresponding liability for future expenditures is included in deferred contributions as disclosed in Note 4.
